- Abstracts not to include graphs, tables, images or references

Keynote Speaker:

Professor Ferner Biography: Professor Rosalie Ferner graduated in modern languages from University College London and studied Medicine at the Medical School of Newcastle on Tyne. She undertook training in general medicine in Newcastle and gained experience in oncology at the Royal Marsden Hospital, London.

She was accredited in neurology in 1996 and has been a consultant neurologist at Guy's and St Thomas's since 1999.

She was appointed Professor of neurology in 2010 and is chairman of the medical advisory board of the national Neuro Foundation. She has been national lead for the nationally commissioned NF1 service since 2009 and lead for the London NF2 service since 2010. The aim of these national neurofibromatosis services is to give expert, multi-disciplinary, holistic care for people with complex, multi-system disease.
